

Here are two definitions from Wikipedia and Wiktionary respectively:

web log: a shared on-line journal where people can post diary entries about their personal experiences and hobbies; "postings on blog are usually in chronological order" and website that allows users to reflect, share opinions, and discuss various topics in the form of an online journal while readers may comment on posts.

So how does this help you as a genealogist?

The first benefit of reading blogs is the possibility of connecting with previously unknown cousins; cousins who share your passion for genealogy. Those elusive clues about our ancestors can come from many different places including blogs. The second benefit may apply to a smaller group of us, but blogs provide an avenue to share our "stories". Many of us proclaim our desire "publish a family history" but in reality that is a daunting undertaking. But writing a blog post, just a couple paragraphs about one particular ancestor or memory, that seems doable, even fun and for this, blogs are the perfect vehicle.
